This is a love ballad by Prince William Pitt Leleiōhokukalahoʻolewa (1854-1877), the brother of King David Kalākaua, Queen Liliuokalani and Princess Miriam Likelike. His name, "flight on the day of the full moon", commemorates the funeral of Kamehameha III. A gifted composer, it was believed he would have been a wise king had he not died prematurely of rheumatic fever, at age 22. In the 1940's, there was a parody based on this mele titled "Ta Ha Ua La." It was given English lyrics, an upbeat tempo and popularized by Spike Jones singing the lyrics in a guttural tone. It became known as the "Hawaiian War Chant" and is often confused with "Kāua I Ka Huahuaʻi," the original song.
